Treaty #6 Medicine Chest Clause

- Treaty # 6 signed in 1876 was the most significant treaty in relation to health,
- Treaty #6 contained the 'Medicine Chest Clause'.
- The medicine chest was kept in the home of the Indian Agent for use by, or at the discretion of the Indian Agent.
- Interpretation health care to all Aboriginal people forever.



Crimean War 1854-56

 Florence Nightingale brought 38 volunteer nurses with her to the Crimea. The assumption was she also brought medicine chests with her to use in caring for the wounded soldiers.

Francis Parthenope Nightingale:

Older Sister

- Florence had one older Sister Francis Parthenope Nightingale.
- Parthenope was born a year earlier 1819, and was also name after the city of her birth Naples

(FNM, 2023d, 2023l, 2025)

- Parthenope, at first opposed to her sister becoming a nurse,
 but later became an active supporter of Florence's work.
 (McDonald, CJ, 2025c)
- Parthenope was a writer and a journalist and used her marketing skills to help promote Florence's work.

Francis Parthenope Nightingale:



Lord Verney & Lady Verney

- In 1857, Florence rejected Lord Verney's marriage offer (and 2 others previously) but introduced him to her sister Parthenope and they married the next year in 1858 (FNM, 2023, 2025; McDonald, 2001; McDonald, CJ, 2025c).
- Parthenope then became Lady Verney and lived at
- Claydon House, the ancestral home of the Verney family.

Lady Verney Dies

- Lady Verney (Frances Parthenope nee Nightingale Verney) (1819-1890) died May 12, 1890, at 71 years (on Florence's 70th birthday).
- We presume that Lady Verney gave or willed FNMC to Mr. Isaac Milsom before or on her death?

A future entry in the Florence Nightingale Museum (opened 1989 in London one hundred years later), stated that Lady Verney often gifted some of her sister's possessions to friends and family [FNM: 1004, 0097, and 0099]





Isaac Milsom (1860-1933)

- Isaac Milsom was born in March 1860 in Didmartin, Gloucestershire, England
- Isaac's parents were John Milsom (1819-1888) and Hester Milsom (1820-1905).
- His father, John Milsom was born in 1819 Oldbury on the Hill, Gloucestershire, England and died in Gloucestershire, England at age 69.
- His mother Hester Milsom (1820-1905) was born and died in Gloucestershire, England at age 85
- John Milson (1819–1888) and Hester (1820–1905) had three children: James (1855), Ann (1858), & Isaac (1860).

Mary Ellen McNabb (1861-1917)

- Mary Ellen McNabb was born August 12, 1861 in Assleagh, county of Mayo, Ireland
- Mary Ellen was highly educated at Trinity University in Dublin, Ireland and Magdalen College in Oxford England.
- Mary Ellen won honors in literature at Magdalen College, and wrote articles on literature for that college.

Isaac Milsom (1860-1933)

- In 1870, Isaac at age 9-11 attended Waxell Boys School in Somerset England (1870, Somerset England Schools Registers 1860-1914 for Isaac Milsom: Ancestry.com, 2020).
- In 1871, Isaac (11-12ys) and his family were still living in Didmarton, Gloucestershire, England (1871 England Census, Ancestry.com, 2020).

Year of Marriage (1885):

- Isaac Milsom (26) married Mary Ellen McNabb (24) in 1885 in Baliankill, Ireland (1885 Ireland Registration Marriage Index).
- The Milsoms had the first two of their seven children in Ireland.
- Herbert Isaac Milson (1886-1978) and Harry Gordon Milsom (1889-1937) were born in Kylemere, Galway, Ireland (Canada, WWI CEF Personnel Files, 1914-1918, Sept 28, 1914).

Immigration to Canada

- In 1909, the Canadian Census shows that the 2nd oldest child of Isaac & Mary Ellen's children Harry Gordon Milsom at age 19, immigrated to Canada.
- In June 1911, aged 21, Harry was recorded in the census in in Portage La Prairie, Manitoba.

1912 Milsom Family Immigrates to Canada

- Long after Lady Verney had passed in 1890 and two years after Florence Nightingale had passed in 1910,
- Isaac and Mary Ellen Milsom immigrated to Canada in 1912 with six of their seven children (Census of MB, SK & AB, 1916) bringing the medicine chest with them,
- Their 2nd oldest son Harry Gordon Milsom was already in southern Manitoba

They came to Saskatoon, Saskatchewan for Isaac to do

landscaping for the city.


- Soon after arriving in Saskatoon, Mr. Isaac Milsom met and became friends with Dr. Hugh Dalton Weaver, who was also originally from England (Saskatoon Daily Star, 1914).
- An article in the Saskatoon Daily Star (2014) connects the two men as both on the list of judges of gardening displays at a Flower Show in Saskatoon, along with other gardening related names, sponsored by the Saskatoon Horticultural Society (City of Saskatoon Archives, 2020)

Mr. Isaac Milsom- Landscaping

• Isaac Milsom was hired to do landscaping for the City of Saskatoon. Mr. Isaac Milsom worked for the Park Department in Saskatoon from at least 1914 to 1918 (City of Saskatoon Archives, 2020).

Isaac was the first Director of the Saskatoon
 Horticulture Society, and member on board of Saskatoon

Parks (Saskatoon Star Phoenix, 1933).

1917 Mary Ellen Milsom Passes



On Sept 1917 Mary Ellen Milsom died. 'Mrs Milson had famous friends in the old country'

- An article about Mrs I. Milsom's death in the Saskatoon Daily Star (1917) did not mention her first name (typical of the era)
- The article revealed Mrs. Milsom had been highly educated at Trinity University in Dublin, Ireland and Oxford University in England, but also had been an intimate friend of Florence Nightingale.
- The article stated Mary Ellen was often included in Florence Nightingale's circle of intellectuals as she was known as a clever speaker and writer on educational and social problems of the day.



 In April 1991 shortly after his wife died Isaac went to Regina to train WW1 vets in forestry techniques

1921

- Isaac was not in Regina long as by 1921 he was in Philadelphia, PA.
- Perhaps he was recruited as he was known as the best trained man in Horticulture in Western Canada (Star Phoenix, 1933).



1933 Isaac Milson Passes

 Isaac Milson died in Philadelphia, PA on April 28, 1933 at age 73 of diabetes (Ancestry.com, 1933; Star Phoenix, 1933).






- Milsom, Herbert Isaac (1886-1978) Born Aug 13, 1886 in Kylemere, Galway, Ireland; died Mar 17, 1978
 @91 in Riverside County, California, USA. Immigrated to Canada in 1912; Sept 1913, Herbert John Milsom, aged 27, married Athalene Prime, aged 26, in Salem, Marion County, Oregon, USA; divorced.
- 2. Milsom, Harry Gordon (1889-1937) Born Aug 12, 1889, in Middle Claydon, Bucks; died Aug 9, 1937 @47 in Buffalo, NY. Immigrated to Canada in 1909 to Port Le Prairie MB; Harold served overseas during the First World War. 1914-1918 (WWI) (CoS Archives, 2020). Harry married twice. In 1917 aged 28, he married Kathleen Dora Mary Sproull, aged about 21, on 28 August 1917 in Battle, Sussex, England, and they were divorced; in 1928, at age about 38 he married Edna H McKinley, aged about 33, in New York County, NY USA.



Herbert (Hal) Dutton Weaver (1867-1942)

- Herbert (Hale) Dutton Weaver was born March 12, 1867 in Manchester, Lancashire, England and died September 12, 1942 in Saskatoon, SK, Canada.
- Herbert's parents were Richard Thomas Weaver (1832-1885) and Elizabeth Dutton (Smith) Weaver (1832-1917).
- His father, Richard Thomas Weaver was born January 12, 1832, in Cheshire, England & died 31 July 1885, aged 53, in Oxford County, ON, Canada.
- His mother Elizabeth Dutton (Smith) Weaver was born June 26, 1841, in Aston,
 Warwickshire, England. and died December 30 1917, aged 76, in York County, Ontario,
 Canada.
- Herbert 's was 4th of 8 children born to Richard Thomas Weaver (1832-1885) and Elizabeth Dutton (Smith)Weaver (1832-1917)


• In 1880, Alice Thomas was born in Stellarton, Nova Scotia.



Herbert Dutton Weaver (1860-1942): Year of Immigration (1880):

 Herbert D. Weaver at age 13 immigrated to Canada from England in 1880 with his parents who settled in Woodstock, Ontario.





Dr. Herbert D. Weaver

- In 1897, at age 30, Dr. Herbert D. Weaver graduated from Trinity University in Toronto as a physician and then moved to Halifax.
- For several years, Dr. Weaver lectured at Dalhousie University Medical College.
- Beginning in 1901 while in Halifax he worked on a clinical team who were involved in installing the first x-ray equipment in Nova Scotia (Saskatoon Star Phoenix, 1942).





Weaver's First Home in Saskatoon

- In 1906, Dr Hugh Dalton Weaver (age 39) married Alice Thomas (age 26) in Halifax and moved that year to Saskatoon.
- In 1906, the Weaver's first home in Saskatoon was on the site of the present Victory Theatre.







Early X-ray Machine

- In 1907, Dr. Herbert Weaver (MD) brought the first piece of medical X-ray imaging equipment in Western Canada, to Saskatoon just one year after Saskatchewan became a province.
- The early X-ray unit—a Ranney-Wimshurst-Holtz Static machine—is the prized piece of a collection lost in time "It was state-of-the-art medical technology at that time
- Dr Hugh D Weaver had lost two fingers from the radiation of the x-ray machines.
- Dr. H. Weaver later donated the x-ray machine and the Florence Nightingale medicine chest to the University of Saskatchewan. (Shewaga, 2019).

 In 1911, the Weaver's built a new home at 4th Ave & 20th St. Saskatoon, SK (Saskatoon Star Phoenix, 1954)








Flower Show




Dr. Weaver's Interest in Trees

- Dr. Weaver also had an interest in what types of trees and shrubs could be grown in this prairie city and was a board member of the Saskatoon Horticultural Society, often holding meetings at their home.
- The Saskatoon Horticultural Society was formed in 1913.
 Membership has fluctuated over the years.







Dr. Weaver's Interest in Trees (cont.)

- Early on Dr. Weaver established an experimental tree farm that years later became Lake Shore Nurseries in Saskatoon.
- In 1958, Weaver Park, in Saskatoon was named in his honor i (City of Saskatoon [CoS] Archives, 2020).





- Lewis Thomas attended the University of Saskatchewan for his first undergrad degree




Nurses Tea at the Bay

- A Nurse's Tea was held at the Hudson's Bay Store in downtown Saskatoon.
- The successful event, attended by over 300 people, featured on display the Florence Nightingale Medicine Chest.
- Owners of the chest at that time were Dr. and Mrs. H.
 D. Weaver (Saskatoon Daily Star, 1940).

Nurses Tea at the Bay, January 19, 1940

 A Nurses Tea and Red Cross fundraiser held at the Hudson Bay store auditorium in downtown Saskatoon showcased the medicine chest, with the claim that this medicine chest was used by Florence and her nurses in the Crimean War.

 Over 300 people attended this successful fundraiser hosted by the British Graduate Nurses Unit No 1, along with Dr. & Mrs Weaver, who were recognized as the current owners of the Chest (Saskatoon Star Phoenix, 1940).



Dr. H. D. Weaver dies

• Some of Dr. Weaver's life accomplishments listed in his Obits was that he introduced first x-ray machine to Saskatoon; he was a board member of Saskatoon Horticulture Society; later in 1956 Weaver Park later named in his honor (Saskatoon Star Phoenix, 1942).

Alice Weaver died in Halifax in 1954

- In 1950, Alice left Saskatoon after 44 years to live in Halifax, where her family was from.
- In 1954 Alice she died in Halifax at age 74. (Saskatoon Star Phoenix, 1954).

Nephew

- Alices nephew who they raised since age 14 attended the funeral,
- Dr. Lewis Herbert Thomas at that time was the provincial archivist for SK (Saskatoon Star Phoenix, 1954).

• Weaver Park, in Saskatoon was named in Dr. H.D. Weaver's honor in 1958 (City of Saskatoon [CoS] Archives, 2020).



1956, Medicine chest donated to University of Saskatchewan

- In 1956, the medicine chest was donated by Dr. H. D. & Mrs. Weaver to the University of Saskatchewan. (Con Archives: Brown et al., 2008; Saskatoon Daily Star, 1942; 1954).
- We presumed correctly that the medicine chest was bequeathed or willed by the Weaver estate to the College of Medicine, USask, as Dr. Weaver had passed in 1942 and his wife Alice in 1954.
- Alice Weaver's nephew Dr. Thomas handled the estate after his aunt died in 1954 (confirmed by Robert Thomas in 2024)



Treaty #6 Medicine Chest Clause

Tommy Douglas-Father of Universal Health Care in Canada



- Tommy Douglas, became the premier of Saskatchewan (SK) from 1944-1961 and leader of the New Democrat Party (NDP) 1962-1966
- In 1947, Tommy Douglas established a system of state-run health care in the province of SK, the first such system in the nation; by 1961 all provinces signed on to Medicare,
- In 2004, Tommy Douglas was voted the Greatest Canadian of all time.





Florence Nightingale Medicine Chest in Canada

The Florence Nightingale medicine chest is a historical artifact dating back to 1850s. Florence Nightingale, the founder of modern nursing, purchased the medicine chest in England and took 38 volunteer nurses to the Crimean War (1854-1856) to care for wounded soldiers.

TIMELINE below depicts the continuing journey of the medicine chest to Canada through its custodians over two centuries



Brief History

1854–1856 Medicine chest allegedly taken with Florence Nightingale to Crimean War
 1890 (approx.) Medicine chest given by Lady Verney (1819-1890), sister of Florence Nightingale (1820-1910), to Mr. Isaac Milsom (1858-1933), gardener and Mrs Mary Ellen (McNabb) Milsom (1862-1917) friends of both sisters
 1912 Medicine chest came with Mr. & Mrs. Milsom and family when they immigrated to Canada, where Isaac would do landscaping for the City of Saskatoon



1918 (approx.) Medicine chest given by the Milsoms to Dr. Hugh D. Weaver (1867-1942) and Mrs. Alice (Thomas) Weaver (1880-1954) friends from the Saskatoon Horticultural Society



1956 (approx.) Medicine chest given from the estate of Dr. and Mrs. H. Weaver, by nephew of Alice Weaver, Dr. Lewis Herbert Thomas (1917-1983), to the University of Saskatchewan, College of Medicine



1974 (approx.) Medicine chest given to University of Saskatchewan, College of Nursing
2020–2024 Research began to Explore the Secrets and Providence of the Medicine
Chest. This project draws on research supported by the Social Sciences
and Humanities Council.

Research findings validated the authenticity of the chest once belonging to Florence Nightingale, through archival document search and finding living descendants (children) of Dr. Lewis Herbert Thomas who validated the family story - Jean Thomas (1948-) and brother Robert Thomas (1950-).

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
