In September 2014, the College of Nursing began offering the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program in Yorkton, in partnership with Parkland College and Sunrise Health Region. In order to keep our regional stakeholders informed about our programming, we provide annual reporting on program indicators, such as student numbers, success rates, clinical placements and outreach.

It is our hope that by working closely with local stakeholders we will:

- improve recruitment and retention
- provide a nursing education that is contextually relevant for our Yorkton-area students
- leverage clinical placements and other program components to positively impact regional health care
- position our graduates to be community leaders and improve regional health outcomes.

We will continue to seek and invest in relationships that are mutually beneficial for the College of Nursing, our students and our local partners.

2016/17 Student Admissions and Enrolment

The College of Nursing allocates 15 seats annually to the Yorkton site. However, in September 2016, we over-admitted and brought 17 qualified applicants into Year 2 (Year 1 is a pre-professional year of Arts and Science prerequisites offered by Parkland College and other institutions).

In total, the Yorkton site has 39 BSN students: 20 in Year 2, 13 in Year 3 and six in Year 4.

- Four, or 10%, are self-declared Aboriginal
- Thirty-four (83%) are female and five (13%) are male
- Two are international students
- The average age of our Yorkton cohort is 24 years, with a range of 19 47 years of age.

The 39 students come from 18 different high schools. Of communities with more than one student originating, 13 are from Yorkton, three are from Preeceville, three are from Melville and two are from Esterhazy.

A relatively large number of the students – 14 – plan to complete their BSN requirements over 4.5 or five years. However, only three have withdrawn from the program since it began in 2014, resulting in a very high retention rate of 93%.

We are looking forward to our first Yorkton site graduates in the Spring of 2017!

Clinical Placements

Clinical placements are an essential part of nursing education. While students learn many nursing skills in the classroom and lab through simulated experiences, it is important for their personal and professional development to be exposed to a variety of clinical experiences outside of the lab.

The following chart outlines the clinical experiences planned for the Yorkton students in the 2016/17 academic year.

Currently, clinical placement needs are being met by Sunrise Health Region. As more students transition into fourth year courses, there will be a greater need for community placements and preceptor placements in 2017/2018.

The College of Nursing has deadlines set for placement requests being sent to the Health Regions in accordance with agreements with other nursing programs throughout Saskatchewan. The requests indicate if they are being sent on behalf of a Yorkton-based student.

Summer Student Placement

The College of Nursing was fortunate to hire 2nd year Yorkton student Shelby Lang as a summer student in 2016. Shelby was placed with the Yorkton Tribal Council (YTC) to work with and provide support for two nutritionists and their programming within YTC First Nations.

Shelby also contributed to the Undergraduate Student Research Assistantships (USRA) poster presentation under the direction of Dr. Lynn Jansen, Associate Dean Southern Saskatchewan Campus. Her report was titled Working Relationships: Translating Knowledge for Chronic Care Management in First Nation Communities.

Lunch and Learns

The College of Nursing's Professional Academic Advisor and Aboriginal Nursing Advisor work with Parkland College counsellors to organize several lunch and learn presentations on an array of topics designed to engage current nursing students at the Yorkton site. These sessions give nursing students an opportunity to network with professionals who work in the community, ask

questions and learn practical nursing content that can be applied to nursing theory and clinical or lab courses. Lunch and learn sessions are provided at key times to support the students throughout the academic year. Presentations have been shared and teleconferenced from Regina and have been very well attended by students.

Career Fairs

Every year, College of Nursing staff and faculty attend several career fairs in Southern Saskatchewan, including those hosted at Tribal Council and First Nation band schools. Recruitment in Southern Saskatchewan is based on building relationships with schools, guidance counsellors, post-secondary counsellors, students and parents who attend these fairs. Faculty, Professional and Aboriginal Academic Advisors interact with interested high school students, adult learners and the general public who seek to know more about the University of Saskatchewan nursing program and how to apply.
