In September 2014, the College of Nursing began offering the Bachelor of Science of Nursing (BSN) degree program in Yorkton, in partnership with Parkland College and Sunrise Health Region. In order to keep our regional stakeholders informed about our programming, we provide annual reporting on program indicators, such as student numbers and success rates, clinical placements and outreach.

It is our hope that by working closely with local stakeholders we will:

1) improve recruitment and retention

2) provide a nursing education that is contextually relevant for our Yorkton-area students

3) leverage clinical placements and other program components to positively impact regional health care

4) position our graduates to be community leaders and improve regional health outcomes.

We will continue to seek and invest in relationships that are mutually beneficial for the College, our students and our local partners.

2017/18 Student Admissions and Enrolment

The College of Nursing allocates 15 seats annually to the Yorkton site, which we successfully filled in Fall 2017. Our total Bachelor of Science of Nursing enrolment in Yorkton is 47 students.

- Four, or 9%, are self-declared Aboriginal.
- Two are international students.

- The median age of our Yorkton students is 22 years, with an age range of 19 - 40+ years.
- Our retention rate in Yorkton (2014/15 – 2016/17) is 93%.

The 47 students come from 18 different high schools. Of communities with more than one student originating, 17 are from Yorkton, five are from Melville, three are from Preeceville and three are from Canora.

A third of our incoming 2017 cohort, and 19% of our Yorkton students overall, are male. This is the highest proportion of any of our six campuses, and a very positive trend.

First Graduates

In June 2017, the first graduates from our Yorkton site convocated, Jessica Funk, Shelby Hersmiller, Eric McDowell and Jesslyn Schigol. All have since successfully passed the NCLEX – the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses. Congratulations to our newest alumni and good luck in the future!

Graduate Eric McDowell had this to say about being in Yorkton. "Taking the program at the Yorkton site with small class sizes was very beneficial to my learning. At times, it seemed as though we were receiving one-on-one instruction. Being from Yorkton, I did not have to move or rent a home in another city and best of all, I got to see my family each and every day when I got home. Another benefit of completing my program in Yorkton was not having to look for a new job to help pay bills in a different city... I was able to keep my current job and fortunately, I had a very supportive employer who allowed me to work when I could."

The College of Nursing has some new faces in its Leadership. Lab Opening

On March 3, 2017, the College of Nursing hosted a come and go reception to celebrate the official opening of the Nursing Clinical Skills Lab at the Yorkton Regional Health Centre. The new lab provides a consolidated and standardized practice space to host nursing labs in the second and third year of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program. It includes four patient beds, simulation mannequins and various medical devices. Michelle Fish is the Clinical Learning Technician for the lab. Interested in what a clinical placement looks like? Here is a summary of what the students did for their NURS 431 practicum, led by Clinical Associate Mobola Ogunbiyi, in Yorkton at The Society for the Involvement of Good Neighbors (SIGN).

- The students organized health promotion activities, arts and crafts for children attending the after school club.
- Students participated in the dayto-day activities at the Yorkton Family Resource Centre. They

led group sessions and cooking classes for children, as well as activities for kids, such as 'germ tag' and 'nutrition bingo'. They also interacted with parents attending the Centre.

Course Innovations

Our Leadership course, NURS 422, similarly included a poster event at Yorkton Regional Health Centre. One issue of particular interest was captured in the poster entitled, "Preventing Workplace Violence in Healthcare", by Yorkton students, Presley DeCock, Paige Fogg, Emily Ksyniuk and Jillian Henry-Wilkinson. The poster provided an overview of workplace violence, including a definition and statistics pertaining to nurse-to-nurse or lateral violence and the role of nursing leaders in promoting violence-free workplaces.

Assistant Professor Kathy Rodger, who is based at our Regina campus, used remote presence (robotics) technology to remotely teach a clinical nursing course in Yorkton. The Yorkton RP-Vita Robot "Seymour" was used to facilitate this process. Rodger communicated with instructors and students directly on the nursing units via Seymour. Rodger was able to communicate, role model and advise clinical teachers about course requirements and teaching strategies, and was able to provide real-time advice in clinical practice situations to promote optimal student learning.

A new service delivery model has been developed for clinical instruction in Yorkton Public Health. The University of Saskatchewan contracted a Sunrise Health Region employee to teach our students three days a week. The employee was able to retain their Sunrise position, and seniority, and the health region billed the College for the days they taught our students. This was very effective, and allowed the students to get an exceptional clinical experience as they were being taught by the person who was actively working in the role of Public Health Nurse.

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- Students worked with a public health nurse to deliver services to drug/substance users with the needle exchange program. They did some health promotion activities for the clients, including adding 'quick facts' stickers on HIV and Hepatitis given on free lollipops, as well as pamphlets on overdose.
- Students gave health promotion presentations to the students at Dream Builder's High School, Yorkton's alternative high school, including information on drug abuse and drug free activities, working through anxiety and Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs).
- Health promotion poster presentations with various booths were displayed in Kamsack at the New Beginnings Community Outreach Center, Dream Builders and at Parkland College. These included information on HIV and Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) for HIV Awareness Week.

Career Fair Events

Each year, College of Nursing staff and faculty attend several annual career fairs in southern Saskatchewan, including Tribal Council and First Nation band school career fairs. Recruitment in southern Saskatchewan is based on building relationships with schools, guidance counsellors, post-secondary counsellors, students and parents who attend these career fairs. Faculty, as well as, Professional and Aboriginal Academic Advisors who attend career fairs, interact with interested high school students, adult learners and the general public who seek to know more about the University of Saskatchewan nursing program and how to apply.

Summer Student Placements

Third year nursing students Collette MacArthur and Shelby Lang were hired as Summer Students with the College of Nursing. Shelby assisted Yorkton Tribal Council nutritionist Kristen Soloway on a number of activities, including diabetes education and the Yorkton Tribal Council Culture Camp.

Collette conducted research on early childhood literacy, piloted two eBooks on the Seven Sacred Teachings (targeted at different age groups) co-created by two other Indigenous nursing students, and assisted with the Yorkton Tribal Council Culture Camp held August 21 - 23, 2017.

HIV Awareness Week

Fourth year nursing students Jillian Henry-Wilkinson, Taylor Trost, Courtney Severson, Dara Yacishyn and Presley DeCock did some wonderful work in November to highlight HIV Awareness Week, as Saskatchewan faces the highest rates of HIV infection in the country. On November 30th, the nursing students hosted a pizza fundraiser to purchase and maintain supplies for a condom dispensary at Parkland College. They further provided awareness to many students about HIV, other Sexually Transmitted Infections and contraceptives.

On December 1st, World AIDS Day, the students further organized a community luncheon at the New Beginnings Community Outreach Center in Kamsack. They also provided basic information on HIV and

encouraged group discussions with local peer support workers from the Sunrise Health Region.

The students were able to garner support from many partners, including Save on Foods (Yorkton), Prairie Grain Bakery (Kamsack), Lifestyles Condoms, Deanna Bartok and the Sunrise Health Region, and Gwen Machnee and Parkland College. Clinical instructors Marie Dietrich Leurer and Mobola Ogunbiyi were also integral to planning these events in their clinical rotations and Heather Cote-Soop and the College of Nursing provided assistance and funding.

Truth & Reconciliation

Parkland College and the College of Nursing in Yorkton hosted a lunch and learn October 6th for students, staff and faculty to learn about First Nation and Métis culture and the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Calls to Action. The event was sparked by 4th year student Jillian Henry-Wilkinson, who wanted to do something to promote reconciliation in her community. During the event, a Reading for Reconciliation library was unveiled and at an information kiosk, guests were able to learn about the Truth & Reconciliation Calls to Action, the Medicine Wheel buttons and background on First Nations and Métis people in Saskatchewan. Elder Corrine Brass from Cote First Nation talked about local Indigenous culture and everyone shared a traditional meal of soup and bannock. During the event, students, staff and faculty took part in an interactive art project; using red, yellow, black and white paint, participants dipped their hands in paint and applied it to a pre-drawn medicine wheel.
